## Mail-in Ballot Voting System

Are you unable to attend the November 9, 2022 General Election for the RM of Beaver River? We offer the option for mail-in ballot registration. If you are unable to register for a ballot in person, a voter's registration form and mail-in ballot declaration can be filled in and witnessed by any of the following:

- ♦ the returning officer (at the municipal office);
- ♦ the deputy returning officer (at the municipal office);

OR

- ♦ an enumerator;
- ♦ a notary public;
- ♦ a commissioner for oaths;
- ♦ any other person authorized to sign oaths; or
- ♦ a lawyer.

## Sask 911

The Saskatchewan Public Safety Agency Sask911 system provides province-wide access to 9-1-1 emergency call taking. 9-1-1 calling is available from landlines and payphones in the province, and from cellphones and wireless devices if they are in range of a cell tower. The Sask911 system is a program funded through a monthly fee on telephone lines and wireless devices.

Emergency calls for police, fire, rescue or emergency medical services are taken by trained 9-1-1 operators. These trained call takers determine the nature of an emergency and transfer the call to an emergency dispatch operator.

In Saskatchewan, 9-1-1 calls are taken by Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs) in Regina, Saskatoon and near Prince Albert. The cities of Saskatoon and Regina (through their local police services) manage the PSAPs in their respective communities and answer 9-1-1 calls within their municipal boundaries.

The 9-1-1 calls for the remainder of the province are answered near Prince Albert at a PSAP managed by the Saskatchewan Public Safety Agency.

### What is 911?

911 is the universal number for emergency police, fire and emergency medical services. 911 is available in Saskatchewan 24 hours a day.

### When should I call 911?

Call 911 when people or property are in danger. Examples of 911 emergencies include a fire, a crime in progress, or a need for emergency medical services.

### Suppose I need the police but it's not an emergency?

If your complaint is not an immediate threat to life or property (such as a parking complaint, a noisy party, or lost and found articles) call the non-emergency number for the police in your community. RCMP Pierceland 306-839-3330.

### Free emergency calling

Calls can be made free from payphones and cellular phones anywhere in Saskatchewan where cellular service is available. Simply dial 911.

### Tips for using 911

Remain calm and speak clearly. Identify which emergency service you require (police, fire or ambulance) and be prepared to provide the following information:

- What is the location of the emergency?
- What is happening?
- What is the phone number you are calling from? What is your name and address?

Please remain on the line to provide additional information if requested by the operator. **DO NOT HANG UP** until the operator advises you to do so.

### What to teach your children about 911

Do your children know how to get help in an emergency?

- Tell your children to call 911 in an emergency.
- Teach your children their address and telephone number as young as possible. Keep the address and telephone number posted by all phones in case they are unsure.
- Tell your children to answer all of the emergency operator's questions and to stay on the phone until they are told to hang up.
- Teach your children about the dangers of making prank 911 calls.



## Fall was once called "harvest"

During the 12th and 13th century, fall was called haerfest in Middle English, which later developed into "harvest." This is because autumn is the end of the growing season, so farmers would harvest their crops.

In the early 17th century, people started moving into cities, which made the term "harvest" diminish. Instead, they started saying "fall of the leaf" to refer to the season. Overtime, the term was shortened to "fall."

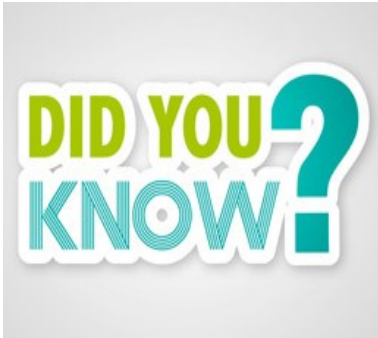
